



MyProxy

This tutorial will briefly cover the command line usage of the MyProxy client. There is also a java web start client for MyProxy which may be obtained from <http://tiber.dl.ac.uk:8080/myproxy/myproxy.jnlp>. The usage of java web start client is not covered in this tutorial.

1. The first step is to **destroy any existing proxy certificate**. You should also **verify that the certificate has been destroyed**. This step is only necessary so as to demonstrate how MyProxy works and is not needed in ordinary MyProxy usage. If you need help on destroying proxies see the GSI tutorial [here](#).
2. MyProxy will by default store a proxy certificate for 7 days. However the training certificates used in this course will expire before then and this will cause an error with MyProxy. Register a proxy certificate for 2 hours in the MyProxy server (the -c option below) using the command:

```
myproxy-init -c 2
```

This will prompt you firstly for your grid-proxy passphrase and then for a new passphrase for accessing your credentials from the MyProxy server. It is a good idea (more secure) for this passphrase to be different to your grid-proxy passphrase. By default MyProxy uses your local username to store your credentials.

```
[user00@pub-234 user00]$ myproxy-init -c 2
Your identity: /C=UK/O=Grid/O=Training/OU=NeSC/CN=User00
Enter GRID pass phrase for this identity:
Creating proxy .....Done
Proxy Verify OK
Your proxy is valid until: Fri Oct 28 15:44:41 2005
Enter MyProxy pass phrase:

3. To demonstrate the process of retrieving myproxy credentials use the following command to retrieve a delegated proxy from the MyProxy server:

```
myproxy-get-delegation
```

and then examine the state of your grid-proxy using

```
grid-proxy-info
```

Note how your proxy does not last beyond the expiry of your credentials in the MyProxy server.

```
[user00@pub-234 user00]$ myproxy-get-delegation
Enter MyProxy pass phrase:
A credential has been received for user user00 in /tmp/x509up_u508.
[user00@pub-234 user00]$ grid-proxy-info
subject : /C=UK/O=Grid/O=Training/OU=NeSC/CN=User00/CN=proxy/CN=proxy/CN=proxy

As has already been explained proxies can in turn issue proxies and that this has in fact happened twice in the process of obtaining a delegated proxy via MyProxy,
